The State of Ohio 3 On the Twenty first day of September
Richland County, Ad. 1835 personally appeared in open Court,
being a Court of Record viz. the Supreme Court of the State of
Ohio in and for the County of Richland, James Haggan and
a Resident of said Richland County and State aforesaid, aged
Seventy Seven years next November, who being first duly sworn,
according to law doth, on his oath, make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the Provision made by the act of
Congress, passed 7th June 1832 that he entered the service
of the United States, and enlisted in its army, in the month
of September 1775 near Centerville, then in the County of
London and State of Virginia, and for the term of one year in
the company commanded by Captain Simon Triplett
the Regiment commanded by Col. William Grayson
being if he rightly recollects, called Minute Men; that
he served and continued to serve in said Company and
Regiment or corps, organized and commanded as aforesaid,
until about Christmas, December 25th 1776 as herein after men-
tioned when he was discharged from service in Alexandria
in the State of Virginia, that he served under the following
named officers viz. Col. W^m Grayson, Major Levin Powell,
Captain Simon Triplett, Lieutenant John Thornton and
Ensign Apollo Cooper, that he was sworn in when he was
enlisted viz. at one Samuel Cox's Mill near said Centerville;
that he marched thence, to Sum forces in the Potomac;
thence to Fredericksburgh, thence to Williamsburgh, thence
to Yorktown, thence to Hampton, and thence back to Alex-
-andria when he was discharged as aforesaid; that
during the above service, and about the 1st of April 1776
he was dismissed, and went home with orders to re-
-appear at a Minutes notice, where he remained
till late in May following when he was again called
out, and thereupon went to Alexandria and joined
the same Regiment, which he thinks & believes was the
3^d or 4th Virginia Regiment, still commanded by

the same Col W^m Grayson. About harvest he was again permitted to return home to get in the harvest where he remained about two weeks as nearly as he can now recollect, and was then again called out, and returned to Alexandria, and there continued in the service under the said Col W^m Grayson until or near the Christmas following when he was discharged from service as above stated; that he served under the above enlistment and in said Grayson's Regiment as aforesaid about fourteen months with the exception of the two absences above stated. that he received a discharge signed by said Captain Simon Triplett which he has lost, but he knows not that in and during the above service he was in no considerable battle, but was in a skirmish when and where the British attempted to land a little above Hampton, he was also when in the militia service in another skirmish at Richmond when Manchester on the opposite side of the River was burnt. Therefore that on his oath declares and states that in the spring of that year in the fall of which Lord Cornwallis was taken at York Town, he entered the service again in the Militia of the United States in the Virginia troops or militia and served in said militia under the following named officers, viz Major Samuel Cox & Captain John Humphreys; that he resided in said Loudon County when he entered the said militia service; that he marched from said County to Grodenak, bough on the Rappahannock; thence to Williamsburgh near James River - thence to York Town; thence back to Williamsburgh: Thence to Richmond. that while he lay at the last named place Manchester on the opposite side of the River was burnt by the enemy; that Genl. Wayne while the said place was burning came up & joined us with some Regular troops and artillery, and compelled

the enemy to retreat & that he was discharged the succeeding evening, having served at this time two months: that he also the same year served two months at Winchester in said State guarding the Prisoners of War ^{so there} taken off at New Jersey under Captain James Zimmerman, Lieutenant Patrick Shanahan and Ensign James Danbar, in the summer following the taking of the above named Prisoners - that his memory is not very good as to the time of this last service, but as to its length he is quite certain: nor can he distinctly state & recollect what Prisoners they were he was so employed in guarding - but only that he was served two months under the last named officer in guarding Prisoners at said Winchester: that he has not in his power or possession any documentary evidence to prove his service other than the deposition of one Ethell now on file in the Pension Department to which he refers: the said Ethell and this applicant having enlisted the same day together, and being Messmates in the same Company commanded by Capt. Triplett of aforesaid under his said first enlistment, and service of 14 months as aforesaid: together with the deposition of William Meekab now dead to prove his enlistment, which said last mentioned deposition this applicant had also sent to the said Department from Belmont County Ohio. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity, except the present, and declares his name is not on the Roll of the Agency of any State; that he has a Record of his age taken from his Father's bible and that his answers to the following interrogatories are true as stated, the same being propounded to him by the Court.

1st Where and in what year were you born.

Answer - In the State of New Jersey in the year 1758

2^d Have you any Record of your age and if so where is it -

Answer - Yes I have at home and I took it from my father's bible.

3^d Where were you living when called into the service? Where have you lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

Answer - In Loudon County Virginia where I continued to live till about 28 years since - since which time I have lived in the State of Ohio, part of the time in Belmont County, and part in Richland County where I now live - the greatest part in Richland County.

4th How were you called into the service? Were you drafted? Did you Volunteer, or were you a Substitute?

Answer - First I enlisted as in my previous statement first of all - For my second time in service I was drafted, and I volunteered for the third.

5th State the Names of some of the Regular officers who were with the troops where you served, such Continental & Militia Regiments as you can recollect, and the general circumstances of your service?

Answer - We served very little with the Regular troops whilst I was in the service & we were employed chiefly as militia men in repelling invasions & sudden descents, guarding the shores of the Potomac & James Rivers.

Answer I received a discharge signed by Capt. Simon Triplett as above stated, but never received any other. The above discharge I have long since lost, and I think lost by my children to whom as a paper of no use, I gave it as play thing -

On this twenty first day of February 1835 per-
-sonally appeared in Open Court being a Court of Record &c.
the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Richland
and State of Ohio James Hagerman resident in said County
aged seventy eight years last November who first being duly sworn
according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provision made by the Acts of Congress of the
18th March 1818 and the first of May 1820 that he the said James
Hagerman enlisted for the term of one year in the month of Septem-
ber 1775 near Centerville then in the County of Loudon State
of Virginia in the Company commanded by Captain Solomon
Dixwell in the Regiment commanded by Col. Wm. Grayson
on the Continental Establishment of as the soldiers of the State
of Virginia that he continued to serve in the said Corps until
about Christmas December 25 1776 as hereinafter mentioned
when he was discharged from the service in Alexandria in the
State of Virginia that about the 1st of April 1776 he was dis-
missed and went home in the Orders to reappear at a
minutes notice where he remained till late in the month
of May following when he was again called to go to Alex-
andria & joined the same Regiment still under command
of said Col. Grayson about harvest he was again permitted
to return home to get in the harvest where he remained about
two weeks or nearly as he can recollect & was then again cal-
led out and returned to Alexandria & there continued in the
service under the said Col. Grayson until or near Christmas
following when he was discharged from service as above stated
that he thereby relinquishes his every claim whatever to a Pension
except the present that his name is not on the Pension Roll of
any State and the following are the reasons for not making
~~an~~ earlier application for a pension Viz that he did make an
application for a pension about twelve years ago or thereabouts
under the agency of Eliaah Parker Esq of Mansfield Richland
County Ohio that he failed in that application for want of
sufficient proof not being able to find his discharge & believes
it to be lost that he has since applied & failed for the same or
other reasons to him unknown that he did not know of any person
alive who served with him in the service until last Fall when
he learned from a Gentleman of this State who accidentally staid
with him a single night of the existence of a Comrade and
brother soldier of his in the same Company by the name of

Anthony O'Shell & case, Deposition he has been fortunate enough to obtain in proof of his services of the said James Hagerman and Anthony O'Shell being mesmates in the same company

And in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 15th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land & naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 15th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property as securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed
